

2.3 Extra exam exercise

Contractor: Thank you for coming, Fahid. As you know, the owners will visit the construction site

in person this afternoon, so it's time to evaluate the project so far. Even though you joined our team only five weeks ago, you've worked in this field longer than the rest

of the team put together, so your input is much appreciated.

Builder: Anytime, Mitchell!

Contractor: Let's discuss planning first. It's a real shame we're running a week behind schedule.

What was the main reason for the delay, do you think?
