

Ben's official name is the Great Bell.'

If you want to travel to Big Ben yourself it is easiest to take the underground. You can get out at Westminster Tube station. Go straight on, turn right at the crossroads. Then
 take the second street on the left. The tower is right in front of you. You can't miss it.
