Thanking People Around The World

A study has looked at conversations in different countries to determine how often we say 'thank you'. The research involved speakers of eight languages from five continents, with around 200 volunteers in each nationality group. The results of the 1,650 participants were published in June 2018, and showed that thanking isn't as common as you might expect.

The researchers focused on casual talk between people familiar with each other socially, rather than in business situations, and recorded it using cameras in indoor settings like restaurants and homes. They measured the use of 'thank you' in the various languages, as well as other phrases used to imply thanks. Researchers found that, on average, gratitude was expressed in only 5% of possible situations. Cha'palaa, a language spoken by an indigenous Ecuadorian tribe, never said 'thank you' at all. In fact, speakers of this language have no such word.

Other languages involved in the study included Lao in Asia and Siwu in Africa. Neither expressed thanks frequently, with Siwu second from the bottom, slightly above Cha'palaa. Polish speakers thanked each other in 2.2% of cases. At the other end of the scale, Italians said thank you in 13.5% of possible situations, just behind the British. However, even they only thanked others in 14.5% of cases.

While these results may suggest the world is less polite than we thought, researchers were unsurprised. Results confirmed that the closer our relationship, the less likely we are to express thanks. Instead, we take the help of close friends and family for granted. They also said that, 'Second-language learners of English often fail to say 'thank you' at all. As expressing gratitude can be considered rude in some cultures, they worry about offending someone.'

Researchers do know that, regardless of nationality, people almost always do what they have been asked. Just because the English and Italians thank others more, this does not prove they are more grateful, or in fact more polite. It shows that they are taught to express thanks as children growing up. However, all nationalities have a similar unspoken understanding that they will cooperate with each other. Perhaps this makes saying 'thank you' unnecessary.
