

Documentary Heritage

- Represents records that hold the memory of our shared past.
- Take form in varied forms: papyrus, parchment, palm leaves, wooden & stone tablets, manuscripts, books, maps, photographs, paintings, oral traditions, music, films, digital files & audio-visual media.

Why it is important?

- Plays a key role in helping us understand the present and predict what is likely to occur in the future.
- Affects how we make sense of ourselves and our surroundings, how we interpret streams of information and make decisions.
- Keeps communities together and preserving their cultural identities.



Passing it to **future generations** and encourage them to appreciate its value is important so the **heritage of the humanity can be preserved**.





Memory of the World (MoW) Programme

Memory of the World (MoW) Programme was launched in 1992 to guard against the collective amnesia, calling upon the preservation and access to the documentary and digital heritage of greatest relevance to the peoples of the world.

by :

unesco

- facilitating preservation of the world's documentary heritage, particularly in areas affected by conflict and/or natural disaster;
- enabling universal access to documentary heritage worldwide;
- **enhancing** public **awareness** about the significant of documentary heritage among the wider public.

War and social unrest, lack of resources, looting, illegal trade and destruction cause documentary heritage to disappear forever.

How will it be used in this Project?

Teachers share their lesson plans and receive feedback (opptional)

unesco

Teachers take the ecourse



Teachers can use resources from the ecourse for their lessons Create shared lessons with their partner school's teachers Teachers meet in briefing session organized by UNESCO

Based on the ecourse, teachers exchange with other teachers on the piece of documentary heritage



What are the requirements for schools?

- High level of English
- Stable internet connection
- Teachers must have some time available to take the e-course & plan & hold 2-3 online shared lessons

- Identify suitable schools and teachers
- Share your feedback on and experiences in international school cooperations with ASPnet and MoW





Fundraising

Activities with current seed funding

- Creating UNESCO <u>project advisory group</u> (MoW, ASPnet, GCED, Teachers)
- Identifying and onboarding <u>participating</u> <u>countries and schools</u>
- Organising <u>launch event</u> during 30th anniversary of MoW
- Providing <u>e-course</u> & organising <u>meeting to</u> <u>deepen learnings</u>
- <u>Supporting teachers to develop shared</u> <u>lesson plans and hold shared classes</u>
- Issuing certificates of participation
- Creating 3 <u>impact stories</u> for UNESCO website
- Organising end of project event


Activities with additional seed funding

- Providing <u>funding support to schools</u> for (a) ensuring technology and internet for exchange and shared lessons with partner school (e.g. bandwidth or travel to UNESCO or NatCom Office) & (b) Field trips to documentary heritage institutions (archives, libraries, museums...)
- Creating and animating <u>online community space</u> (project hub, partnership page, discussion fora, etc.)
- Organising 2 <u>expert-facilitated workshops</u> on documentary heritage and GCED
- <u>Collecting quantitative and qualitative data</u> to better understand how global collaboration between schools around documentary heritage can foster GCED
