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
English: a global language

B English is a global language

You have learned what a global citizen is: a citizen of the world. So, can you guess what a global language is? That's right, it's a language of the world: a language that is spoken by many people in many countries.

English is a global language. So if you want to learn about living in another place in the world, it helps you if you speak English well.

How did English become a global language?

CHALLENGE

All around the world, you will find people who are able to understand and/or speak English. How did English become a global language? Let's look at history to find the answer.

Year	At that time
1500	the English language was only spoken in Britain: England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales.
1600	British people started travelling abroad to far-off places. Ships were built better and the roads were better, so travelling was easier. The British took the English language with them. The first English migrants settled in America.
1700	the British colonies (<i>nederzettingen</i>) in America grew very quickly and English became the first language of Northern America.
1820 – 1920	British colonies also grew in other parts of the world and Britain became an Empire (that's a super power, <i>wereldrijk</i>). They ruled over one hundred countries and many millions of people. English became the second language in these countries.
1950	nearly half of the world population spoke English!
1960 – present day	many of the countries that the British ruled now wanted to be independent (onafhankelijk) and wanted to rule (regeren) their countries themselves. The British Empire became smaller but English is still growing as a global language.

The map below shows the British Empire when it was a super power in about 1900. All the pink countries were part of the British Empire! English was – and still is – the first or second language in these countries. This is why English is a global language.

First language and second language

In countries such as the USA and England, English is a first language. A first language is the language you learn to speak first, from your parents. It is your native language (moedertaal). In many other countries, English is a second language. This is not the native language of most people that live there, but another language they have learned to speak fluently (vloeiend).

English can sound very different around the world. Listen to how English is spoken in different places in the video clips on the right:





When it comes to native speakers, English is not the most spoken language in the world; that is Chinese! Take a look at the top ten below.

1 Chinese — 1.3 Billion Native Speakers

2 Spanish — 460 Million Native Speakers

3 English — 379 Million Native Speakers

4 Hindi — 341 Million Native Speakers

5 Arabic — 315 Million Native Speakers

6 Bengali — 228 Million Native Speakers
