
Can't stop now - I'm on a roll

Richard Rodriguez, 39, from Miami is very 5 25 tired but he keeps going. He has already broken the world record for riding a roller coaster, but he won't get out of his carriage at Blackpool 5 amusement park. At the same time Normand St Pierre is riding a roller coaster in Montreal, 6 30 trying to break the world record too. "That roller coaster in Montreal is a killer," says Rodriguez.

The wind blows away his words as the roller coaster car makes a dip. "I can't say when I will stop. First I have to know what St Pierre is doing." Mr Rodriguez's supporters are keeping an eye on his rival via the Internet but there's no sign that St Pierre is giving up.

Blackpool on 18 June when Rodriguez, who has held the world record since 1994, began a non-stop ride with only a five-minute break every hour. St Pierre started his record attempt in 20 Montreal 48 hours later.

4 Rodriguez broke the world record last Wednesday, but he's still on the ride which throws him 70ft into the air and then drops him to ground level, reaching speeds of 35 miles per hour. 25 He gets about five hours' sleep per night in the carriage which has been specially changed for him. He can stretch his legs because the iron bar in the middle is removed and two side panels have been put in so his belongings won't fall out.

There is plenty of foam-rubber and a piece of canvas to protect him during the night. He wears car plugs to be sure he gets some sleep. In the morning he spends about an hour – all his five-minute breaks put together – out of the carriage to take a hot shower and eat breakfast. He eats snacks and other meals on the ride. He reads newspapers between dips when his carriage is not going so fast.

"The weather hasn't been too kind," Rodriguez said, looking tired and worn out. "I haven't been getting a lot of sleep because of the wind and rain." He was afraid of roller coasters as a child but overcame the fear at the age of 16, when he made a ride in Coney Island. He set his first roller coaster record on that same day in 1977.

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
